



inactive members a reason to attend chapter and lodge events. Hopefully offering an incentive for inactive members to come to events will expose them to the fun and excitement that the OA has to offer.

Finally, the award also stresses service in itself. Since the OA was founded in 1915, is has remained committed to service. This requirement is designed to ensure that brothers will either participate in community service or help the lodge by serving as an Elangomat during ordeals.

Below is a complete list of these requirements. Each lodge chief and adviser has more information and can answer questions.

Arrowman Service Award Criteria

Personal: (Complete All)

- ☐ Remain active in your unit (or, if an adult not in a unit, active in your Scouting role) through at least 75% meeting attendance.
- ☐ Help an Ordeal member attain Brotherhood.

- ☐ Mentor a Scout (or, if an adult, another Scouter) in your unit.
- ☐ Rededicate yourself to the principles of the Order of the Arrow through discussions with a lodge officer or adviser.

Chapter/Lodge Activity: (Complete Any Three)


- ☐ Participate on a lodge camping promotion or unit elections team.
- Attend and serve in a leadership capacity at two lodge functions.
- ☐ Serve as a chapter or lodge officer or as the Chairman of a lodge operating committee.
- ☐ Attend a Section Conclave, National Leadership Seminar, or National Conference.
- ☐ Serve as a trainer in an Order of the Arrow training event.

Service: (Complete One)

☐ Participate in council, chapter, or lodge service project.

☐ Serve as an Elangomat at Ordeal.

Completed items may be signed off by a Arrowman's Scoutmaster, Lodge Chief a Lodge Adviser. The Award may be order through your lodge.



Change In Adult Arrowman Nomination

Number Of Adult Nominations Based Upon Size of Unit

Each year upon holding a troop or team election for youth that results in at least one youth candidate being elected, the unit committee may nominate one registered unit adult, 21 years of age or older, to be a candidate. The nomination is sent to the lodge adult selection committee that is composed of the lodge adviser, the chairman of the council committee on which the lodge adviser serves, and the lodge staff adviser.

A policy change this year enables troops or teams having more than 50 registered active youth to nominate an additional adult for every 50 registered active youth or fraction thereof. As an

example, a troop having 51 to 100 registered active youth may nominate two adults each year if at least 1 youth has been elected. Recommendations of the adult selection committee, with the approval of the scout executive, serving as Supreme Chief of the Fire, will be candidates for induction, provided the following conditions are met:

■ Selection of the adult is based on the ability to perform the necessary function to help the Order fulfill its purposes, and it is not intended for recognition of service, including current or prior achievement and position.

- The individual will be an asset to the Order because of demonstrated abilities that fulfill the purpose of the Order.
- The camping requirements forth for the youth members a fulfilled.
- The adult's membership w provide a positive role model: the growth and development of t youth members of the lodge.



R-5 Lodge Receives OA Service Grant Skyuka Lodge Honored With A \$1,500 Grant

For several years the National Order the Arrow Committee has provided tching service grants to lodges. The mts, limited in number, are for projects smitted by application to the national A office. A total of \$30,000 was made available for distribution to

lodges in 2001 for these projects.

design of the project; how the project impacts a significant number of Scouts; and how the project enhances Cub Scouting or Boy Scouting in the council.

Over 70 lodges submitted applications for the 2001 grants, but only 12 lodges were selected to receive the awards. SR-5's own Skyuka Lodge was one of the fortunate recipients.

Skyuka Lodge received \$1,500 for the construction of a pair of high and low trap houses at the shotgun range located at Camp Bob Hardin. The council camp had been using hand thrown targets, so it was in need of some type of improvement. The lodge's project will enhance shotgun shooting as a recreational activity and as a merit badge.

Congratulations to Skyuka Lodge and lets see another SR-5 lodge get one next year.


Eswau 560 Adam Lutterloh, Lodge Secretary
