Chiefly Speaking

Several months ago, I presented three simple questions to our Section Vice-Chief Greg Smith and our Section Secretary Jason Laney: If not now, when? If not here, where? If not us, who?

The questions were not mine. They have been asked and borrowed and modified by leaders throughout history, most recently by President Reagan, who used these questions in his second inaugural address to discuss a crucial turning point in America's history.

Our organization is encountering its own turning points in 1999, a year in which challenges have been surmounted like never before so we can serve our members better. I asked our officers these questions to convey a sense of urgency, a sense of personal accountability and the need for action. In that regard, the questions are more important than the answers.

Nationally, a new initiative has begun to draw the Order of the Arrow closer to those we serve, both our units and our councils. First, the Order of the Arrow Troop/Team Representative program will establish a youth

representative as the liaison serving between the local lodge or chapter and his unit. In his unit, he will serve as a communication and programmatic link to and from Arrowmen, adult leaders.



and Scouts who are not presently members of the Order. Thus, he will enhance the image of the Order as a service arm to his unit.

Our Quality Lodge program has been reengineered with new requirements for 2000 that will not only serve as a basis for fostering and strengthening lodge - council relationships, but also challenge lodges to meet the needs of those they serve within the Scouting program and the community.

A new, interactive Lodge Leader Development Program will also be instituted

in 1999-00 to train lodge leaders and advisers with a program that best suites each and every lodge's individual needs.

Our Section training conference ArrowTech is scheduled for November 5-7 to assure that every lodge leader and adviser can constantly and consistently deliver our most important message - that people come first in every decision we make - to every member of our organization. This leadership



development opportunity is designed to teach every leader in the Order of the Arrow how to serve and to equip each of them with the knowledge and resources to do better the jobs that have been entrusted to them.

We have also realigned our section

We have a preliminary budget, patch designs, and are looking forward to the section COC meeting in November, so that we can share our ideas with the rest of the section. We are planning to have the Dixie packets mailed to the key three of each lodge the first Week of October, so that they can review the information, ideas, and suggestions, prior to the meeting. We hope that if any suggestions or changes can be made prior to the meeting, this will save time and effort on all our parts.

FF: What should an arrowman look forward to at the Dixie?


TL: Camp Daniel Boone is a beautiful camp in the Blue Ridge Mountains. We are proud our our camp and the beauty contained there. We always have snow at our March Fellowships, so who knows, we could even have snow at the Dixie. Tsali Lodge has always prided itself on our culinary capabilities. The food for this year's Dixie will be good, and there will be a lot of it. Our shows committee has also been working hard to plan the best shows possible.

FF: What changes can the lodges expect to see at this year's Dixie?

We are planning on bringing back the Vigil breakfast on Saturday morning. We feel that this is a great opportunity for all the Vigils to get together and Fellowship. We are also

planning to revamp the registration process.

This has always been a slow and irksome process and we have been looking at new ways to expedite this.



We feel that the key three of the lodges will be happy with the menu for the key three dinner on Friday Night. The host lodge coordinator has planned an excellent menu and our chef is prepared for the challenge. Another thing that we are excited about is our hospitality. We southerners have always been known for our great hospitality and we have a few surprises for the delegates when they get here. FF: What would you like to see happen with the registration process?

TL: We would like to see the lodges arrive together. This will help in the process because we have limited, very limited parking at Camp Daniel Boone, so car pooling and vans would be greatly appreciated.

FF: What about the physical facilities at the camp? TL: We have a full camp. We have 24 campsites, and a physically challenged site as will. Each site has latrine facilities and we have two shower houses.

FF: Will the canvas be set up during the weekend for the Dixie?

TL: Unfortunately not. This time of year here in the mountains, we never know what the weather will do, so setting the canvas will not be feasible. If we set it and left it up until summer camp, you would be looking at an entire camping season (two months). We will have tarps and canopies set up for the fellowship, but brothers will need to provide their own tentage for the weekend.

FF: What about the meals and dining arrangements?

TL: We will probably have to eat in shifts. We will have a large tent in the field for brothers to dine under, in addition to the dining hall.

FF: Is there anything additional that you would like to tell the brothers of SR-5 about the Dixie?

TL: We hope that everyone in Sr-5 will come up to the mountains where they can expect good food, fun

and great fellowship. Any suggestions that the lodges have, we will appreciate. We are looking forward to the new millenium and hosting the first Dixie of the new cnetury. Also, we will be holding our Fall Ordeal and



Fellowship weekend on October 14-16, and we hope that any key three members from the other lodges, who would like to see the camp, will come up and see us.
