Itibapishe Iti Hollo #188



Order of the Arrow to offer Northern Tier Program to Arrowmen by Jason Accola, former Region Chief

You have been to Philmont? You have done Trail Crew. Now, experience the Voyage! The summer of 1999 will mark the kickoff of the Order of the Arrow's most exciting program to date - The OA Northern Tier Wilderness Voyage. For only \$100, participants ages 16-20 will have the opportunity to spend two weeks in the Boundary Waters, one of America's most pristine wilderness areas. Stationed at the Charles L. Sommers National High Adventure Base, the OA Voyage program will include one week of portage trail and campsite maintenance and will conclude with a one-week adventure into the Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness.

During their Voyage, participants from across the nation will experience an exclusive OA program that will be

both challenging and inspirational. Dates of the two-week program for the summer of 1999 are June 9, 16, 23, 30;July 7, 14, 21; and August 4, 11. Earlier this sum-

mer, a design team composed of four Arrowmen, Jason Accola, Ryan Racicot,

Brain Yancey, and David Yoder spent the months of June and July at the Charles L. Sommers High Adventure Base. They led crews into Boundary Waters and learned the operation of the Northern Tier program.

In addition to their responsibilities as staff members, the design team has laid the foundation for the program that will be implemented over the course of the project's duration.
