

The 2003-2007 Order of the Arrow Strategic Plan, "A Legacy of Servant Leadership," identifies three areas of focus for the brotherhood in the coming years: leadership, service, and financial

support. Our commitment to financial support demonstrates the Order's dedication to enabling the brotherhood

to be more effective in our support of Scouting.

As the plan notes, "Program support at both the national and local council levels requires a f i n a n c i a l foundation. The Order of the

Arrow must insure that it has adequate financial resources to meet its program goals in a quality fashion, both nationally and locally."

For lodges, the commitment to financial support will be reflected in two initiatives. First, the OA of each council is asked to redouble their efforts to support council operations and outdoor programs. This support is expected to come in the form of in-kind contributions and service projects.

Secondly, through the James E. West fellowship program, lodges should make a conscientious effort to support council endowment building. This will help councils towards building a

renewable source of income for Scouting service.

Nationally, the Order of the Arrow will continue to self-fund national OA programs and operating expenses. Increasing the endowment to five million dollars is a stated goal of the Strategic Plan. Additionally, the national committee will provide funding support to selected lodges for their efforts to support outdoor programming.

In all, the financial support aspect of the strategic plan is designed to bolster the Order's support of programmatic efforts. Finance makes the program

possible.
